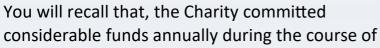




INTRODUCTION FROM THE PRESIDENT

The Committee would consider applications for financial support from non-Masonic Charities from within the Province in an effort to raise the profile of Freemasonry with the added benefits of involving Freemasons in Community projects and hopefully encourage recruitment.

Recognising the significant positive impact the Community Fund Committee has had in this respect, the Board have committed to continuing with the work of the Committee on completion of the Festival under its new name of "The Grants Committee", and broadening its operating guidelines to include all Charitable giving from the Province.

To complement this newly formed Committee and to oversee a clear Marketing, Communication and Fund Raising strategy across the Province we have also created "The Fund Raising Committee", which will assist the Charity in securing a sound financial base into the immediate future.

The consolidation of the National Masonic Charities into one central organisation continues and is expected to complete in April 2016 under the name of "Masonic Charitable Foundation". The Province continues to receive considerable support from the various Masonic Charities and this can be best highlighted by the £25,000 grant we received within days of the devastating floods in various districts within the Province at the end of 2015. These monies have made a considerable difference to many families within the affected areas.





At the AGM in September 2015 we saw Paul Rose retire as Chairman of the Charity and I want to recognise his tireless commitment to the Charity, having served as a Director for over the past 20 years. I know that Paul will continue to support the incoming Chairman – Chad Northcott.

In closing I wish to once again thank the Board, Chairman and Members of the Sub-Committees and our ladies in the Welfare Office for their continued efforts on behalf of the Charity, without their commitment our Charity could not provide this essential and important work.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The ELMC was incorporated on the 13th January 1904. The Provincial Grand Master of the Masonic Province of East Lancashire is a non-Executive Director and President of the Charity. The Deputy Provincial Grand Master is also a non-Executive Director and the Deputy President. The business and affairs of the Charity are directed by the Board of Directors/Trustees in accordance with the Articles of Association, and managed on a day to day basis by the Operations Director, Julie Ward, and part-time Administrative Officer, Karen Hall.

Voting Members, known as Representative Members, are appointed by each Lodge and Chapter of the Masonic Province of East Lancashire. Any person may become an "Individual Member" of the ELMC at the discretion of the Board providing they make a contribution of at least £60 per annum. These Members are entitled to attend the Annual General Meeting and to receive a copy of the Annual Report, but at the AGM are not entitled to cast a vote.

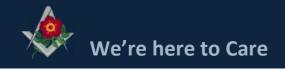

Three non-Executive Directors including the Chairman of the Museum Committee, with an option for a total of up to five non-Executive Directors.

The President, the Deputy President, the Provincial Grand Almoner and the Provincial Grand Charity Steward (who will also act as Chairman of the newly formed Fund Raising Committee) are all ex-officio Members of the Board, other Members are elected at each Annual General Meeting.





Induction and Training of Members of the Board:

Upon appointment or election to the Board new Members receive the following:

- 1 Information explaining the extent of the involvement required
- 2 A copy of the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company
- 3 Copies of the most recent Annual Report and Accounts/Statement of Trustees' responsibilities
- 4 An explanation of membership of the Board
- 5 Copy of the Charity Commissioner's Guide to the responsibilities of a Charity Trustee
- 6 Copies of the minutes of previous meetings of the Board

The Board appoints Sub-Committees, which are approved at the Annual General Meeting each year, to consider and make recommendations to it for the management of the Charity. The appointed Sub-Committees are:

The Committee of Benevolence consists of a representative of each of the Districts in the Masonic Province of East Lancashire together with other members nominated by the President or the Board. The role of the committee is to determine the provision of charitable assistance to needy Freemasons, their widows or other dependent relatives. The Committee of Benevolence operates two Sub-Committees – the Comforts Fund Committee and Young People's Committee. Much of the work of the Benevolence Committee is coordinated with the Freemasons' Grand Charity in London, to whom petitions are submitted for consideration.

Hewlett Court Advisory Committee whose responsibility is to offer professional support and guidance to the Director of Operations and Manager.

The Grants Committee supports non-Masonic charities and other good causes that are proposed by Lodges and Districts within the Province of East Lancashire. It also supports direct applications made to it by charities and good causes. It encourages the active involvement of Freemasons within their local communities.

The Fund Raising Committee has a responsibility to oversee a clear Marketing, Communication and Fund Raising strategy across the Province

The Investment Committee. The investment policy is to maximise the long term return on the Charity's Investment funds, subject to the risks normally associated with a balanced approach to portfolio management. The Charity does not restrict itself to any particular category of investment. The performance of the funds is measured against appropriate benchmark indices. The sub-committee monitors the Charity's investments at regular meetings with advice taken from W H Ireland Ltd, its Stockbroker.





OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Charity is the central vehicle for the delivery of Masonic charity and care on behalf of Freemasons in East Lancashire. It augments the charitable work of Freemasons in their Lodges and Districts by supporting those in need within the wider Masonic "family", eligible projects which benefit local communities and other good causes.

The specific objectives for which the Charity is established are:

- The relief of poverty by the provision help and assistance to needy Freemasons, or their widows or any other of their dependent relatives, living predominantly but not exclusively in East Lancashire.
- 2 The education of children of needy or deceased Masons.
- 3 To make grants in cash or kind for the purpose of relieving the immediate and pressing needs of Freemasons or their families who live predominantly, but not exclusively, in East Lancashire.
- 4 To provide help and assistance to other charitable and good causes for the general benefit of the public or communities situated predominately, but not exclusively, in the East Lancashire area.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

ACTIVITIES OF THE YEAR

The core activity of this Charity, since its inception over one hundred years ago, has been to support and care for the less fortunate within our Masonic and the extended community. The number of beneficiaries supported by the Committee of Benevolence and the Welfare Office was 669 in this financial year. In addition to the time given freely by Almoners, Charity Stewards and many other committed Freemasons, the financial value of the grants and support to those beneficiaries in the year amounted to £456,627 of which £343,293 was received from the Freemasons Grand Charity, the Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys and the Masonic Samaritan Fund.





The Grants Committee (Community Fund) is now well established and is giving financial support to projects in which Freemasons are actively involved, bringing benefits which improve the quality of life in local communities. Through its £30K per year allocation it continues to make grants to local charities and good causes where comparatively small contributions make a considerable difference. In 2015 the Fund received 25 applications and issued grants to 23 organisations totalling £31, 524.

In addition, The Freemasons Grand Charity has given grants to 9 hospices in the Province totalling £24,171.

Hewlett Court, the residential home owned and operated by the Charity, continues to provide a happy and caring environment for its residents with a capacity of a maximum of 44 residential places.

Julie Ward, Operations Director for ELMC and Hewlett Court, continues with the management of the day to day activity of the Charity from her base at Hewlett Court.

During the year the membership of the Board and its various committees has been considered and the governance of the constituent parts of the Charity has been kept under review. As reported in previous years we continue to monitor the governance of the Charity and risk management at all levels of the operation.

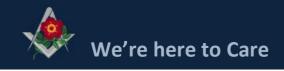

The Committee of Benevolence (COB) meets on a regular monthly basis to consider petitions brought to them by Almoners and other concerned Brethren on behalf of Freemasons, their family and dependants who are thought to be in need, for either financial assistance or other types of support. Whilst financial assistance is the main area provided for, other requirements could be for decorating, repairs to their home, household appliances and special needs equipment to help improve the quality of life.

All petitions are considered first of all by COB and, where appropriate, are submitted to the Central Masonic Grant-Making Charities (which will combine to form the Masonic Charitable Foundation – MCF - in 2016) for further consideration. Due to the way in which Grand Charity now operates in London, all the different Charity organisations work together – Grand Charity, Masonic Samaritan Fund [MSF], Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys [RMTGB] and Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution [RMBI].





In the last year the Grand Charity supported our beneficiaries with a sum of £109,460 and ELMC supported that by an additional sum of £16,958.

The total number of beneficiaries for 2015 was 669 comprising 90 Widows, 18 Brethren, 28 Married Couples, 3 Spinsters, 1 Bachelor, 63 Young People, 38 Residents of Hewlett Court and 428 Widows of Closed Lodges. It is this last figure which is getting larger by the month as more Lodges are forced to close.

During 2015 there were 28 New Petitions for financial support, 96 cases were reviewed and 1 was made a new beneficiary of the Charity.

Although the Committee meets once a month, we aim to react as quickly as possible to any petition and by regular liaison with the Provincial Almoner and Provincial Charity Steward and their teams, supported by Julie Ward and Karen Hall, will deal with all cases as urgently as they merit. We do have discretion to act on a case and have that decision discussed and ratified at our regular monthly meeting. Since the changes at London with the new MCF, we are finding that there are a few teething problems (partly due to new procedures and to new staff) but we are seeing a slightly quicker turnaround in case work. Our new Provincial Welfare Officers are going through detailed training about how state benefits can affect claims and what to look for when reviewing cases. This has meant that we are much better served by more detailed applications and better information gathering.

I have been Chairman since September 2013, having served on the committee for about 13 years, first as a District Almoner and then co-opted. I have been wonderfully supported by the team at Hewlett Court (Julie and Karen) and ably assisted by all of the District Almoners, the Mark Benevolence team, Brian Carter (your Provincial Almoner) and more recently the new Provincial Welfare team.

To all of the above I give my grateful thanks.

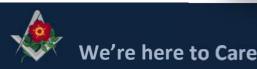
WBro Charles Ward and his Committee members greeted 100 guests of the Charity. There were also a number of residents from Hewlett Court in attendance.

The Committee organises events for Beneficiaries of the Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys who have a Masonic connection in the Province of East Lancashire. The Beneficiaries who attend events normally reside in East Lancashire or a neighbouring Province. Currently there are 58 beneficiaries who live in an area that stretches from the Isle of Wight to Blackburn, and the Fylde Coast to Stockport. It is difficult to organise events that will interest all across a wide range of ages. Twenty-five are aged eighteen or over and in further education at university or vocational training. There are seven aged five or below and twenty-six aged between six and seventeen. When planning events, the Committee concentrates on seeking activities that will be of interest to the six to seventeen year olds who live in the Province or adjoining Provinces.

The events are looked upon by the Beneficiaries as opportunities to meet with friends, who they know have had similar experiences, and with whom they can share new activities and better times. The events also provide a platform where parents/guardians can meet others who have or are working through similar problems, and gain from their experience. The aims of the events are to create an opportunity to partake in new experiences, learn new skills and build confidence. However, the main aim of the committee is to have fun. During 2015 the Young Peoples' Committee hosted five events.

Ghost the Musical, 28th March 2015

On Saturday 28 March a seventeen strong group from the YPC were at Bury Met to see Courtney, one of our Beneficiaries, in her latest role, Molly, in Ghost the Musical. The production by the Youth Theatre Group of Prestwich Amateur Dramatic and Opera Society had the audience's attention from the opening bars to the final curtain call. All the cast showed strong singing, dance and acting







ability. The actors taking the lead roles of Molly, Sam, Carl and Oda Mae all gave strong, confident performances. However, the YPC Group had to vote Courtney's portrayal of Molly as the best performance of the show. We are biased; her rendition of, "With You", and, "Nothing Stops Another Day", didn't leave many dry eyes in the audience. We all look forward to Molly's next appearance.

Chill Factor 9th April 2015

This was our sixth visit to the Chill Factore. During that time, we have seen a number of the Beneficiaries acquire and develop new skills, participating in a sport that they would not have been able to without the support of the ELMC. This year's event was attended by "TLC" and seventeen 'Young People'; a mix of those who had attended previously and novices. The mix of "experience" and "novices" was apparent in those eager to get started, and move their acquired skill to a higher level. The nervous excitement of the first timers in wondering how they would cope was tangible. After two hours on the snow, the group met at the climbing wall. It still surprises the group leaders how much



energy the 'Young People' have in reserve, to engage in a series of climbs that increase in difficulty. The adventures on the snow and climbing wall develop large appetites. 'Nandos' is conveniently located next to the climbing wall. After everybody had eaten and their parents / guardians had arrived, all of the attendees said their goodbyes, expressing a desire to do it all again.

Imperial war Museum North and BBC Tour 28th May 2015

On Thursday 28th May sixteen young people and six parent / guardians joined two committee members at the Imperial War Museum North, Trafford Wharf Road, for a tour of the Museum. The striking Main Exhibition Space featured a timeline of the conflicts that Britain and the Commonwealth have been involved in since the First World War. The YPC were able to discover personal stories of those whose lives have been changed by war. The 'Timestack Exhibitions', where the museum staff bring out items for the visitors to handle and discuss, proved popular with our group, especially the opportunity to don body armour used in recent conflicts.

Following our visit to the IWMN it was a short walk over the bridge to our lunch venue, The Real China Buffet.





The Real China is close to the main reception area of the BBC, the meeting point for BBC Tours. Our guides for the day Jodie, Paul and Verity quickly briefed our group on the safety procedures for the tour and outlined the areas we would be visiting. The tour began with a look at a Radio Studio. Interest was shown by our group in the range of technical equipment used and the roles of the technicians, presenters and producers. Next was the sound stage used for pro-



ducing Radio Drama. The Match of the Day studio created great interest from the group, especially how the holographic pictures of players are displayed and their images avoided by Gary Lineker on his walks. The illusions created by light and the placement of objects were also explained to show us how the Football Focus Studio is changed to create the Match of the Day Studio later in the day. The 'Studio Green Room' shattered our illusion of the comforts enjoyed by the presenters off screen; cramped and drab. The last part of the Tour gave our party the opportunity to be presenters on the 'Breakfast' couch; reading news items and presenting the weather forecast.

New Anderton Centre July 2015

Fourteen Young People accepted the invitation of the YPC to participate in a team building day at the New Anderton Centre. The New Anderton Centre is managed by Lancashire Outdoor Activities Initiative (LOAI,) an independent local charity. The centre has exclusive use of Lower Rivington reservoir for sailing, kayaking, wind-surfing, canoeing and raft-building. A mixture of water and land based challenges had been organised for the day at the centre.

After introduction to our assigned instructors, Adrian and Sarah, the group were divided into two teams and kitted out in wetsuits, floatation aids and helmets ready for the first challenge, 'rafting'. The rafting challenge involves building a raft from a range of available components, launching the raft, sailing to the centre of the reservoir and taking part in a series of races and a range of activities, including the teams standing on the raft. The exercise tests the sturdiness







of the rafts construction. One of our rafts began to disintegrate during the races, resulting in an early bath in the cold water. At the end of the rafting everybody had the opportunity to get wet, by doing a running jump from the end of the jetty. After a shower and packed lunch, it was onto the low ropes, crate stacking and tree climbing. Throughout the afternoon the groups learnt and developed team building skills and in many cases faced and overcame personal fears.

YPC Christmas Party 30th December 2015

In a poll carried out at the summer event, the Young People requested that we return to the Go-karting venue for the Christmas Party. On the 30th December seventeen Young People, accompanied by ten parents and five committee members, met at Prestige Karting, Colne. The venue hosts two activities, Go- karting and Laser Battle Arena. The afternoon was arranged so that each Young Person would have at



least two sessions on the racetrack and two sessions in the Arena.

Each ten minute Go-karting session is frenetic. Contestants are tasked with achieving the fastest lap times in order to reach the Final. The karts have an identity chip to track times and positions that are constantly updated on the screen display. In between the karting rounds, the groups take turns in the Laser Battle Arena, to determine which of the participants can score most points by hitting the targets on their opponent's bodies.

The last event of the afternoon is the Karting Grand Final. The ten participants with the best lap times during the afternoon, battle it out for the honour of being the overall champion. After the awarding of the prizes everybody travelled the short distance to Carlo's Restaurant for the Christmas Party. During the meal we were entertained and amazed by the sleight of hand and mystifying illusions created by WBro Peter Dean, Sunnyhurst Lodge 4631, and his colleague, Donald Monk.

There was one low point during the year when we heard of the sudden death of Angie Pickering. Many of the Beneficiaries had known Angie through her support of our group during Nigel's eleven years of service to the YPC.

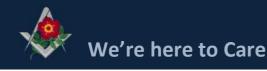

The Community Fund considered 37 applications for funding during 2015; 23 grants were approved totalling £31,524 in total. This was an increase of 4 applications over the previous year (when £35,005 was dispersed). There is ongoing engagement with our local communities across the Province and we expect this to increase, with greater use of the fund as we approach the tercentenary of Freemasonry in 2017. From its launch in 2006 the Fund has approved grants to a total of £344,819.57. The Community Fund continues to support the Teddies for Loving Care Initiative across the Province, providing teddies to help calm anxious children in A&E units and Family Courts.

The Committee has a stable and experienced membership. During 2015 the ELMC post Festival 'Forward Strategy', was approved by the Board of the ELMC and the Community Fund was rebranded as the ELMC Grants Committee; its remit to consider all applications for non-Masonic support and financial assistance, and seeking approval from the Board for any approved Grants in excess of £5,000. The criteria used for approval of awards are wider arranging than hitherto, sitting comfortably within the definitions of charitable causes defined by the Charity Commission. The transition from Community Fund Committee to Grants Committee occurred during the latter part of 2015.

A complete list of approved Grants is displayed on the ELMC website. Supported initiatives are regularly communicated on social media channels and well reported in the Media, by both the Freemasons and the good causes and charities we support. We continue to audit the recipients of approved Grants to ensure our funds are utilised for the purpose they have been given, and to obtain further publicity, both for the good of Freemasonry and the Charity. The role of the ELMC Grants Committee and its





donations cannot be understated, in positively publicising both the Charity and Freemasonry in our local area. We aim to assist in raising our profile amongst the public, portraying a constructive image and positively change perceptions and the understanding of Freemasonry.

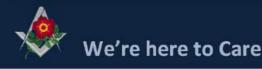

A year of change

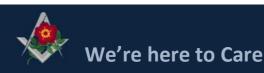

FUTURE PLANS

The core activities of the Charity continue to revolve around caring for our beneficiaries through the Committee of Benevolence, the Comforts Fund, Young Peoples Committee, and the Hewlett Court Management & Advisory Committees. The activities of each of these groups have been fully recorded previously in this booklet. These remain the most important areas of our activity and will continue to be our priority in the year ahead.

Following the conclusion of the East Lancashire 2015 Festival for the RMBI in October 2015 the Province will be promoting the ELMC as the principal recipient of Charitable giving from the Brethren and Lodges throughout the Province; assisted by the newly formed Fund Raising Committee it is hoped this will ensure the financial position of the Charity will be secured and provide a platform for our Charitable giving.

The Grants Committee (previously the Community Fund Committee) will continue to receive applications, consider and make grants to Non Masonic Charities. In this respect the Charity has undertaken a complete review of its operational guidelines in a bid to encourage applications, from the Brethren, Lodges and Districts with the aim of helping promote Freemasonry in the Community.

The ongoing investment and refurbishment of Hewlett Court will continue to ensure that the excellent standard of facilities and service provided for the residents are maintained.

FINANCIAL REVIEW AND RESULTS FOR THE YEAR

The reports and accompanying financial statements reflect the reporting requirements of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16th July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) the Companies Act 2006, and the Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association.

This year it has again been a requirement that the results of the Charity be consolidated with those of its wholly owned subsidiary, the East Lancashire Masonic Hall Company Limited.

The Group's unrestricted total incoming resources was £2,201,247 in the year, compared with £1,507,982 in the previous year, an increase of £693,265, whereas its costs decreased from £1,700,192 to £1,358,146, resulting in a surplus of £843,101 in the year compared with a deficit of £192,210 in 2014. These results include a gain of £906,280 from the disposal of Freemasons' Hall. Other gains and losses relate to movement in investments and show net gains of £57,706 compared with net gains of £65,510 in the previous year, thus the Group's total unrestricted net assets have increased by £900,807 to £4.22 million.

It is the opinion of the Board that the Charity is in sound financial position and has sufficient assets and resources to enable it to continue to carry out its objectives as laid out on page 10.

THE CHARITY'S INCOME

The charity's total unrestricted income has increased by £1,060,874 due mainly to the recognition of a £906,280 gain on disposal of Freemasons' Hall, compensation for £65,000 of Hall Company losses included within other income and an improvement in income received by Hewlett Court. A decline in Grants from Grand Charity has been mitigated by an increase in donation and legacy income, for which we are grateful for the generosity of our departed Brothers. Donations from Freemasons, their Lodges and Chapters increased by £23,848. Investment income also increased to £69,621 from £53,712 in the previous year.

The value of the investment portfolio has increased by £24,772 following investment changes in the year and an increase in underlying values. Your Investment Committee continues to monitor the position very closely.

THE CHARITY'S EXPENDITURE

Costs of the Charity, excluding property expenses, have generally been contained (note 6). Property expenses have increased from £96,531 to £256,463 and this year include £347,862 compensation due to the Hall Company for cessation of its lease and a £137,500 release of a provision made against insurance monies due from the Hall Company. An increase in room rates and improved occupancy has resulted in an operating profit of £87,464 for Hewlett Court compared to £74,092 in the previous year and the depreciation charge has increased to £32,866 from £32,430.

HEWLETT COURT

As mentioned earlier in the report, occupancy rates improved during the year to full occupancy at the end of the year.

HALL COMPANY

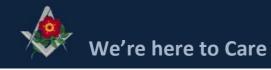
The Hall Company's results, which represent five months of trading to 31st May 2015, have again been consolidated with that of the Charity. The income of the Hall Company decreased to £295,518 from £664,681 in the previous year. The costs decreased from £765,651 to £405,714, see Note 7, resulting in a loss for the period after consolidation adjustments and tax of £110,196, compared with a loss of £97,427 in 2014. The Hall Company received compensation for surrender of its lease from the Charity amounting to £347,862.

BALANCE SHEET

In the opinion of the Board the market value of the land and buildings is considerably greater than the book value. In view of the specialised nature of these assets, the Board considers that it is inappropriate to determine the market value. The total reserves of both the Group and Charity are £4,245,690 at the end of the financial year.

INVESTMENT POLICY AND PERFORMANCE

The present investment policy is to maximise the long term total return of the Charity's investment funds, subject to the risks normally associated with a balanced portfolio Management. The Charity does not restrict itself to any particular category of investment. The performance of the funds is measured against appropriate benchmark indices and during the year the result has exceeded all those benchmarks. The Investment Sub-Committee monitors investments with the assistance of the W H Ireland Ltd.





STATEMENT AS TO DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

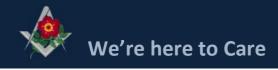
- ensure that the most suitable accounting policies are established and applied consistently

We have audited the financial statements of The East Lancashire Masonic Charity for the year ended 31st December 2015 on pages 38 to 51 which comprise the consolidated and charity statement of financial activities, the consolidated and charity balance sheets and the related notes. In our opinion the information given in the Directors' Annual Report for the financial year for which the financial statements are prepared is consistent with the financial statements.

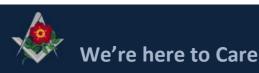

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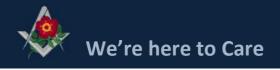

(i) Deferred tax

A deferred tax liability is recognised in respect of all material timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date.

A deferred tax asset is treated as recoverable and therefore recognised only when it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of underlying timing differences can be deducted.

(j) Investments

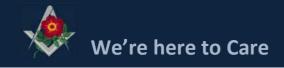
Listed investments are valued in the accounts at the mid-market price at the balance sheet date, including accrued interest where relevant. The surplus or deficiency arising from the valuation of investments is taken direct to the revaluation reserve. Unlisted investments are included at cost less provision for diminution in value. This policy represents a departure from recommended accounting principles, which require all investments to be included in the balance sheet at market value. The directors consider that it is not possible to establish with reasonable certainty the market value of the charity's investment in its subsidiary, without incurring disproportionate costs, which would not be beneficial to the charity.

Realised surpluses and deficits arising on disposals of investments determined by reference to the carrying value of the assets in the charity's balance sheet are included within Income and Expenditure for the year. Realised revaluation surpluses, representing the difference between historical cost and the carrying value of the assets, are reclassified by way of a transfer to general reserves in the year in which the disposal occurs.

(k) Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts or finance leases are capitalised in the balance sheet. Those held under hire purchase contracts are depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Those held under finance leases are depreciated over their useful lives or the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

The interest element of those obligations is charged to the statement of financial activities over the relevant period. The capital element of the future payments is treated as a liability.

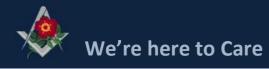
