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INTRODUCTION

Hopefully my message of support for the current Festival with regard to Masonic charitable giving continues until the completion of the East Lancashire 2015 Festival for the RMBI.

I am however aware, as the President, of the ongoing charitable obligation to our own Charity, the East Lancashire Masonic Charity, and the importance of ensuring that the brethren and dependents continue to receive the high standards of care for which we are justifiably proud.

The Province and its dependents continue to receive considerable financial support from the



National Masonic Charities, indeed during 2013 our beneficiaries received in excess of £440,000. These grants along with additional support from the ELMC go a long way to ensure that our beneficiaries maintain an acceptable standard of living during this difficult economic period.

We can not afford to rest on our laurels when it comes to ensuring that the needs of our brethren and dependents are adequately catered for, making it vitally important that the responsibilities of the Lodge Almoner are taken seriously when taking on this office. Brian Carter as our Provincial Almoner, in addition to the support provided by Julie Ward and Karen Hall within our own welfare office based at Hewlett Court, are only too willing to offer help and advice where needed. This assistance coupled with the launch of 'Freemasonry Cares' via the Central Masonic Charities will hopefully ensure that an individual in need is not overlooked.

I am particularly keen to ensure that the work of the ELMC and its various sub-committees is communicated at all levels of Freemasonry within the Province, and to assist in this respect considerable work has gone into developing the ELMC website. The site is regularly updated with information and events organised throughout the year and I am sure you will be heartened by the considerable activity regularly undertaken by the hard working members of each Committee.





At the outset of the current 2015 Festival the ELMC made a commitment to ensure that our Charitable giving to Non Masonic Charities continued during the period of the Festival and I am pleased to confirm that in the region of £30K has been distributed to suitable worthy charities via the Community Fund during 2013. In addition the Charity has also supported sizeable grants to both the Manchester Cathedral in support of its restoration programme and to the Manchester Jewish Museum where the Charity received considerable exposure in support of the recent exhibition of Chagal, Soutine and the school of Paris fine art.

In closing I wish to thank the Board, Chairman and Members of the Sub-Committees and our ladies in the Welfare Office for their continued efforts on behalf of the Charity, without their commitment our Charity could not provide this essential and important work.



STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The ELMC was incorporated on the 13th January 1904. The Provincial Grand Master of the Masonic Province of East Lancashire is a non-Executive Director and the President. The Deputy Provincial Grand Master is also a non-Executive Director and the Deputy President. The business and affairs of the Charity are directed by the Board of Directors/Trustees in accordance with the Articles of Association, and managed on a day to day basis by the Operations Director, Julie Ward, and part-time Administrative Officer, Karen Hall.

Voting Members, known as Representative Members, are appointed by each Lodge and Chapter of the Masonic Province of East Lancashire. Any person may become an "Individual Member" of the ELMC at the discretion of the Board providing they make a contribution of at least £60 per annum. These Members are entitled to attend the Annual General Meeting and to receive a copy of the Annual Report but at the AGM are not entitled to cast a vote.



Three non-Executive Directors including the Chairman of the Museum Committee, with an option for a total of up to five non-Executive Directors.

The President, the Deputy President, the Provincial Grand Almoner and the Provincial Grand Charity Steward are all ex-officio Members of the Board, other Members are elected at each Annual General Meeting.





Induction and Training of Members of the Board:

Upon appointment or election to the Board new Members receive the following:

- 1 Information explaining the extent of the involvement required
- 2 A copy of the Memorandum and Articles of Association of the Company
- 3 Copies of the most recent Annual Report and Accounts/Statement of Trustees' responsibilities
- 4 An explanation of membership of the Board
- 5 Copy of the Charity Commissioners Guide to the responsibilities of a Charity Trustee
- 6 Copies of the minutes of previous meetings of the Board

The Board appoints Sub-Committees, which are approved at the Annual General Meeting each year, to consider and make recommendations to it for the management of the Charity. The appointed Sub-Committees are:

The Committee of Benevolence consists of a representative of each of the Districts in the Masonic Province of East Lancashire together with other members nominated by the President or the Board. The role of the committee is to determine the provision of charitable assistance to needy Freemasons, their widows or other dependent relatives. The Committee of Benevolence operates two Sub-Committees – the Comforts Fund Committee and Young People's Committee. Much of the work of the Benevolence Committee is coordinated with the Freemasons' Grand Charity in London to whom petitions are submitted for consideration.

Hewlett Court Management Committee whose responsibility is to manage and operate, on a day to day basis, the residential home at Holcombe Brook, owned, operated and financed by the Charity. The work of the committee is directly supported by the Director of Operations and the Care Manager.

Community Fund Committee supports non-Masonic charities and other good causes that are proposed by Lodges and Districts within the Province of East Lancashire. It encourages the active involvement of Freemasons within their local communities.

The Investment Sub-Committee. The investment policy is to maximise the long term return on the Charity's Investment funds, subject to the risks normally associated with a balanced approach to portfolio management. The Charity does not restrict itself to any particular category of investment. The performance of the funds is measured against appropriate benchmark indices. The sub-committee monitors the Charity's investments at regular meetings with advice taken from W H Ireland Ltd, its Stockbroker.





OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Charity is the central vehicle for the delivery of Masonic charity and care on behalf of Freemasons in East Lancashire. It augments the charitable work of Freemasons in their Lodges and Districts by supporting those in need within the wider Masonic "family", eligible projects which benefit local communities and other good causes.

The specific objectives for which the Charity is established are:

- 1 The relief of poverty by the provision help and assistance to needy Freemasons, or their widows or any other of their dependent relatives, living predominantly but not exclusively in East Lancashire.
- 2 The education of children of needy or deceased Masons.
- 3 To make grants in cash or kind for the purpose of relieving the immediate and pressing needs of Freemasons or their families who live predominantly but not exclusively in East Lancashire.
- 4 To provide help and assistance to other charitable and good causes for the general benefit of the public or communities situated predominately but not exclusively in the East Lancashire area.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act to have due regard to guidance published by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

ACTIVITIES OF THE YEAR

The core activity of this Charity, since its inception over one hundred years ago, has been to support and care for the less fortunate within our Masonic and the extended community. The number of beneficiaries supported by the Committee of Benevolence and the Welfare Office was 659 in this financial year. In addition to the time given freely by Almoners, Charity Stewards and many other committed Freemasons, the financial value of the grants and support to those beneficiaries in the year amounted to £558,161 of which £445,532 was received from the Freemasons Grand Charity, the Royal Masonic Trust for Girls and Boys and the Masonic Samaritan Fund.





The Community Fund is now well established and is giving financial support to projects in which Freemasons are actively involved, bringing benefits which improve the quality of life in local communities. Through its £30K per year allocation it continues to make grants to local charities and good causes where comparatively small contributions make a considerable difference. In 2013 the Community Fund received 24 applications and issued grants to 17 organisations totalling £30,150.

In addition, The Freemasons Grand Charity has given grants to 9 hospices in the Province totalling £23,515.

Hewlett Court, the residential home owned and operated by the Charity, continues to provide a happy and caring environment for its residents. The occupancy rate during 2013 decreased to 70% (compared with 79% in 2012) of the accommodation which has a maximum of 43 residential places. This decrease can mainly be explained by individuals wishing to remain longer in their own homes, and the inability to provide 'Personal Care' in house.

Julie Ward, Operations Director for ELMC and Hewlett Court, continues with the management of the day to day activity of the Charity from her base at Hewlett Court.

During the year the membership of the Board and its various committees has been considered and the governance of the constituent parts of the Charity has been kept under review. As reported in previous years we continue to monitor the governance of the Charity and risk management at all levels of the operation.

The Committee of Benevolence (COB) meets on a regular monthly basis to consider petitions brought to them by Almoners and other concerned Brethren on behalf of Freemasons, their family and dependants who are thought to be in need, for either financial assistance or other types of support. Whilst financial assistance is the main area provided for, other requirements could be for decorating, repairs to their home, household appliances and special needs equipment to help improve the quality of life.

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All petitions are considered first of all by COB and, where appropriate, are submitted to the Central Masonic Grant-Making Charities for further consideration. The application is then directed to the appropriate Charity. The four National Masonic Charities now work together, they are the Freemasons Grand Charity, Masonic Samaritan Fund, Royal Masonic Trust For Girls & Boys and Royal Masonic Benevolent Institution and a petition will be looked at by the appropriate committee(s).

In the last year the Grand Charity supported our beneficiaries with a sum of £192,745 and ELMC supported that by an additional sum of £40,504.76. The amount from Grand Charity has been reducing over the last few years and this has placed an increasing burden on ELMC for financial support.

The total number of beneficiaries (at the end of 2013) was 659 comprising 113 Widows, 19 Brethren, 31 Married Couples, 4 Spinsters, 1 Bachelor, 64 Young People, 30 Residents of Hewlett Court and 397 Widows of Closed Lodges. It is this last figure which is getting larger by the month as more Lodges are forced to close.

During 2013 there were 47 New Petitions for financial support, 141 cases were reviewed and 9 were made new beneficiaries of the Charity.

Although the Committee meets once a month, we aim to react as quickly as possible to any petition and by regular liaison with the Provincial Almoner and Provincial Charity Steward and their teams, supported by Julie Ward and Karen Hall, we will deal with all cases as urgently as they merit. We do have discretion to act on a case and have that decision discussed and ratified at our regular monthly meeting.

I was appointed as the Chairman in September 2013, having served on the committee for about 10 years first as a District Almoner and then co-opted. I have been wonderfully supported by the outgoing Chairman (Mark Davis) and the team at Hewlett Court (Julie and Karen) and ably assisted by all of the District Almoners, to whom I give thanks.


Spring Party

This venue has become very popular with all our guests. Sixty four widows and Brethren of the Province attended the holiday along with the Comforts Fund Chairman, WBro Charles Ward and his wife Julie. The group met at Middleton Masonic Hall for tea/coffee reception followed by a buffet lunch and a glass of wine [or two] prior to departure for St Anne's. During the week our guests were treated to a days outing to the Tower Ballroom which was a very popular choice with all our guests. Lunch was provided at the Ballroom; an afternoon tea with sandwiches, scones and tea.





On Saturday 1st June we returned to Middleton Masonic Hall for a light lunch before saying our goodbyes until the next time we meet in September for the Autumn Outing. As always the food, facilities and staff at the hotel were fantastic.



In 2013 the Committee organised seven events. This was up on the previous year because we were better able to monitor the school holidays set by local education authorities in which our Beneficiaries reside. The events covered a broad range of activities and were well attended.

The first event of the year was on the 17th February, a visit the Palace Theatre, Manchester, to attend a performance of the Lion King, a highly rated musical collaboration from Disney and Elton John. All of the attendees were enthralled by the performance. The group met at the Peking Court restaurant and enjoyed a Chinese buffet prior to attending the theatre.

On the snowy, cold night of the 22nd March the Committee organised a visit to the Sale Sharks v Bath game. Despite the weather, all of the families who had accepted our invitation arrived at the ground. Our group had the opportunity to meet with two of the Sale Sharks Squad who had been side-lined through injury for a Q&A on being a professional sportsperson. This was the YPC's first visit to a professional sporting venue and everything, weather excepted, went to plan.

A visit to the Chill Factor has become an annual event for the YPC. It is well supported and each year the children attending have been able to further enhance their new skills on the snow. The organisation at the Chill Factor has improved every year. On our earlier trips the Committee Members were fully occupied moving the groups from one activity to another. This year upon our arrival we were introduced to "Jo" our facilitator. Jo ensured that all of the participants were adequately clothed, booted and in the correct coaching session. She even ensured that at the end of the snow activities everybody transferred to the Climbing Wall. Following the climbing all adjourned to Nando's for nourishment, refreshment and excited discussion of the day's event. Manley Mere, new venture for the YPC, was a resounding success. All of the participants thoroughly enjoyed the day. On the 30th May 2013 the group met at Ashton Masonic Hall to join the mini bus for the relatively short journey to Manley





Mere, near Frodsham. The morning session was lead by RYA and BCU instructors. After donning the wetsuits and buoyancy aids the group were taught the basics required to handle kayaks and set off to travel around the lake. Capsizing was definitely the order for the day. Nobody survived the session without going into the water. Paddle boarding added another dimension to the fun and further dips into the lake.

Following lunch the group set off for the Adventure and Assault course. The course is constructed from recycled metal and machinery. It is a "Scrap Heap Challenge". It is designed to become more challenging as you move around the course. Zip wires become longer and higher, swings, slides and seesaws (tilting beams) bigger and heavier. One unlucky member of the group ended up on the wrong end of a "Ducking Stool". The kayaking and paddle boarding instructors complimented our group for their behaviour, attention and more importantly for the care they took of each other and how the older members looked after the younger or less able members.

The trip to the "Tower of London" on the 21st August 2013 was greatly appreciated and enjoyed by the nineteen beneficiaries and parents / guardians who accepted the Young Peoples Committee invitation. The group met at 8.00 am close to the Information Booth at Manchester Piccadilly Station. Shortly after the group had met there was an announcement that all trains to London from Manchester had been cancelled. Fortunately Information Booth staff were able to re-route our booking via Leeds to Kings Cross Station. We would arrive an hour later than planned. After an on- time arrival at Kings Cross and transfer to The Tower we met our Guide for the afternoon. Our Guide, John, gave the group an



overview of the history of The Tower of London before we entered the Tower for an informative and amusing guided tour. The tour included all of the highlights of the site, the Crown Jewels, White Tower, Bloody Tower, The Mint, Traitors Gate etc... Our restaurant, Zizzis, in St. Katherine Docks, was a short walk from the Tower. Everybody was fed and refreshed in some ninety minutes, giving us plenty of time to walk to the junction of East Smithfield and Tower Bridge to hail Taxis for the transfer to Euston Station.

The journey to Manchester Piccadilly was without incident and all of the parent guardians collecting the Beneficiaries were on time and the committee members were able to leave the station at 10.15 pm.





On Sunday 3rd November 17 children, accompanied by 7 parent / guardians, accepted the invitation to polish their ruby red shoes and click their heels three times and join the YPC at the Albert Halls, Bolton, for a performance of "The Wizard of Oz". Following a meal at the "Chinese Buffet" in Bolton the group walked to the Albert Halls. The production by Bolton Premier Productions closely followed the 1939 Judy Garland film.

The whole cast, drawn from the amateur theatre, musical societies and dance academies in the Bolton area, gave an outstanding performance that matched many professional companies. The show starred one of our beneficiaries, Courtney, as Dorothy. Courtney's performance was outstanding. She is extremely talented. The role of Dorothy enabled her to showcase all of her talents, singing, acting and dancing. It is a demanding part, Dorothy is on stage for almost all of the two and a half hour performance. Courtney carried it off with aplomb.



Colne was the venue for the YPC Christmas Party on the 3rd January 2014. The party was attended by twenty five Young People, fourteen Parents / Guardians and six Committee Members and Spouses. The party commenced with a visit to the Prestige Go-karting and Laser Quest at Holker Mill. Following an extensive safety briefing the Young People were divided into three teams of eight. There were six qualifying races of eight Go-karts and a Grand Final of ten Go-karts. This arrangement gave each of the twenty four Young People the opportunity to participate in two fifteen minute qualifying sessions to determine who would claim one of the top ten qualifying lap times. After the qualifying sessions the ten top drivers took their positions on the start grid. An exciting final race was eagerly watched by all of Young People, parents / guardians and YPC members. At the end of the race the winner and runners-up took their place on the Podium for the presentation of the Trophy.

The teams not competing on the track joined battle in the Laser Quest Arena. Competing to see how many of the opposition can be tagged before expending the loaded shots. The contestants expended great energy racing around the Arena shooting off bursts of laser rounds. After the Grand Final everybody travelled the short journey to Carlos' Restaurant in the centre of Colne. The meal and service was

excellent. The highlight of the meal was the table magic performed by Bro Peter Dean, Sunnyhurst Lodge 4631. After performing his magic Peter made time to show the attendees how some of the tricks, illusions were created. After the meal, everybody received a selection box, all the children said their farewells and were escorted to their transport to wend their weary way home.

The Community Fund considered 24 applications during 2013. 14 were successful leading to grants totalling £30,150.18. From 2006 to the end of 2013 the Fund has approved grants to a total of £278,190.60.

Teddies for Loving Care provides Teddy Bears for children attending Hospital A & E departments throughout the Province. Grants are available to Districts to assist in the purchase of those Teddies. 3 applications were received in 2013 and grants totalling £5,053 were made.



The Company continues to operate as a wholly owned subsidiary of the Charity and has prime responsibility for the running of Freemasons Hall, Manchester.

The Company has two main sources of income, those being Masonic business and non-Masonic business. The Masonic business comes from the hosting of Craft Lodges, Royal



Arch Chapters and various side Degrees, as well as associated dinners, lunches, dining clubs and ancillary social functions.

The non-Masonic business consists of hiring out parts of Freemasons' Hall with or without associated catering services to non-Masonic organisations and individuals. This would include such events as breakfast meetings, training sessions, conferences, weddings and various social functions. Freemasons Hall has also been used on numerous occasions by television production companies for the making of television programmes.

During the year an Agreement was signed, conditional upon planning permission being obtained, for the redevelopment of Freemasons Hall.





It is expected that the external works will now commence in September 2014. At some point in 2015 all dining and business activities currently run by the Hall Company will become the responsibility of the new owners of the building and therefore there will be no need for the Hall Company to exist. With regard to the organisation of Freemasonry on the third floor, this will be run through a stand-alone non-profit making organisation that will basically be owned and run by the Freemasons who use the building in line with all other Masonic Halls in the Province. It will therefore not be a subsidiary of the Charity.

We are extremely grateful for the hard work and dedication of an excellent and loyal group of employees, headed by Jon Fryer, the General Manager. The results achieved by Jon Fryer and his staff in extremely difficult trading conditions have been remarkable. All the staff under Jon have pulled together and have achieved results that far outweighed expectation. They are to be congratulated.

The Investment Committee meets on a regular basis to review the portfolio of investments, and aims to achieve a balance of capital appreciation and income return.

In the financial year, the value of our investments increased in value after allowing for capital withdrawals, with gains in equities offsetting falls in the government securities. Income during the period also fell marginally, as a result of those withdrawals but the total return was nevertheless positive at 3.54%.



During the last year we have had three changes in District Charity Steward representation and we would wish to thank those retiring Brethren for all their hard work and their involvement in the charitable causes they have supported. We wish them well in their future endeavours. We offer a warm welcome to the new Brethren taking over these important duties and know that you will continue to maintain the good work of your predecessors.

The District Charity Stewards have again been working hard over this last year in promoting charity in its variable degrees for both Masonic and Non-Masonic causes and although the present climate is improving and there is more certainty now, than there was in the past two or three years, money is still not that freely available.

Domestic costs have risen tremendously in gas, electricity and fuel and foodstuffs continue to rise and will, due to the bad weather we have had and seen throughout the land, ruining crops and livestock during this winter period.





Nevertheless, through their endeavours (Distr.ChStwds) we have seen our Festival figures maintain a steady growth and with 18 months to go before the Festival, we hope that a reasonable figure will be realised to donate to the RMBI in October 2015. The ELMC has not faired very well, donations are considerably down, due in the main to the Festival but a trickle is better than nothing.


The message that our Provincial Grand Master has put out is that the Festival must take precedence, with the ELMC coming next and really non-masonic giving put on the 'back burner' until after the Festival. Charity begins at home, that's what we all hear and good causes will always be in need but we must all remember our own good causes first.

During the year one or two Districts have continued with their giving nights and maintained links within their communities where it is hoped a response to our charity by way of membership may be gained. The Community Fund continues to offer funding to local charitable needs and is a preferred route in order to allow Lodges/ Chapters to donate more monies through to the Festival and ELMC.

The TLC scheme, including the inspirational link with Victim Support service throughout the Province is also being urged forward.

Again for the second year running a special meeting of all District Charity Stewards/ District Almoners and Senior Brethren in the Province has been convened to press home and bring to the forefront of brethren's attentions the work that goes on in the Province, reference to charity. Last year in early 2013, Laura Chapman- Chief Executive of the Grand charity and James Newman – Chairman of RMBI came along and updated those present, along with our own Benevolence Chairman – Mark Davis and the Young Peoples Committee ,who presented a true case study and Brian Carter with Freemasonry Cares.







This year (2014) we managed to have Richard Douglas – Chief Executive of the Masonic Samaritan Fund (MSF) who outlined the benefits available, on medical grounds, to the Brethren and dependants of the Province of East Lancashire. Again a very worthwhile case study of hardship and the relief given through our own Benevolence structure and the Grand Charity (incl.MSF) was presented by Dave McGurty, East Ribble District Charity Steward. Other contributors were Steve Barton – Chairman Benevolence Committee, Stan Bibby – Ecclesholme Committee, Alan Smith – Chairman Hewlett Court, Charles Ward – Chairman Comforts Committee and Brian Sigsworth – Provincial Grand Charity Steward, Dep.Ch. Festival Appeal committee who gave an update on the 2015 Festival.

We are grateful to all these Committees for the exceptional work that they do on behalf of all our beneficiaries without their dedication most of the Brethren and dependants would be far worse off and would be struggling to cope on a daily basis in this present economic climate.

A sincere vote of thanks to all the assistance and help given to our District Charity Stewards by the Hon. Secretary and the Hon. Treasurer of the ELMC and by the Provincial Grand Almoner. We are also ably supported by the Welfare Team, Julie Ward and Karen Hall all of whom do a splendid job in providing back up for our cause.

Maybe we can all look forward to a year ahead that will see the causes of hardship easing and bring about an easier life expectancy!





FUTURE PLANS

The core activities of the Charity revolve around caring for our beneficiaries through the Committee of Benevolence, the Comforts Fund, the Young Peoples Committee and of course the Hewlett Court Management Committee. The activities of each of these groups have been fully recorded previously in this booklet. These remain the most important areas of our activity and will continue to be our priority in the year ahead.

Hewlett Court modernisation has continued during 2013 including much appreciated work in public areas and the surrounding gardens. Further maintenance and improvements will continue in 2014. Particular thanks to Charles Ward and the members of the Comforts Fund for co-ordinating a full and varied social calendar for the residents of Hewlett Court and I am sure they would welcome continued support from the various District Committees in this respect.

It is particularly important that all Freemasons publicise the availability of Hewlett Court to ensure that the Charity can continue to provide excellent care to Freemasons and their dependants.

Income has continued to show a reduction during the year with a decline in contributions. Karen Hall however keeps in touch with donors to encourage their continued support of ELMC during the East Lancashire 2015 Festival for the RMBI. We are also grateful for the kindness, and wish to encourage the forethought of Brethren in the provision of bequests in favour of the Charity.

Brethren are reminded during procedures of closing Lodges and Chapters to make provision in their distribution of financial assets for the future care of Lodge Widows undertaken by the Charity.

Liaison continues in furthering links with Ecclesholme. Brethren should be encouraged to consider a visit to both Ecclesholme and Hewlett Court either individually or collectively via Lodges and Chapters.

Lodge and District requests for support of Organisations and good causes from the Community Fund have increased in 2013. Suitable projects in which Lodges and Districts are involved are to be encouraged, in addition to their financial support of the 2015 Festival and ELMC.

We will continue to monitor the governance of the Charity and risk management at all levels of the operation.





FINANCIAL REVIEW AND RESULTS FOR THE YEAR

The reports and accompanying financial statements reflect the reporting requirements of the 'Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities 2005' (SORP) issued by the Charity Commission for England and Wales. These financial statements comply with the requirements of the Companies Act 2006, and the Company's Memorandum and Articles of Association.

This year it has again been a requirement that the results of the Charity be consolidated with those of its wholly owned subsidiary, the East Lancashire Masonic Hall Company Limited.

The Group's unrestricted total income was £1,595,214 in the year, compared with £1,733,227 in the previous year, a decrease of £138,013, which is explained in more detail below, whereas its costs decreased from £1,929,005 to £1,688,487, resulting in a deficit of £93,273 in the year compared with £195,778 in 2012. The value of our investments increased by £132,836 compared with an increase of £99,259 in the previous year, thus the Group's total unrestricted net assets have increased by £39,563 to £3.46 million.

It is the opinion of the Board that the Charity is in sound financial position and has sufficient assets and resources to enable it to continue to carry out its objectives as laid out on page 9.

THE CHARITY'S INCOME

The charity's total unrestricted income has decreased by £115,327 due mainly to a decrease in legacies, for which we are grateful for the generosity of our departed Brothers. Donations from Freemasons, their Lodges and Chapters were down by £847, which follows a decrease in the previous year of £12,166. Investment income also reduced to £57,417 from £62,118 in the previous year. Other income increased from £10,110 to £35,329.

The value of the investment portfolio has increased by £115,702 following significant investment changes in the year and an increase in underlying values. Your Investment Committee continues to monitor the position very closely.

THE CHARITY'S EXPENDITURE

Costs of the Charity have generally been contained (note 6). Despite costs being reduced and an increase in room rates, reduced occupancy at Hewlett Court has resulted in an operating loss of £9,039 for Hewlett Court compared to a prior year loss of £32,327 and the depreciation charge has decreased to £31,843 from £33,178.

HALL COMPANY

The Hall Company's draft results have again been consolidated with that of the Charity. The income of the Hall Company decreased to £688,281 from £710,967 in the previous year. The costs decreased from £894,762 to £684,385, see Note 7, resulting in a profit for the year after consolidation adjustments and tax of £4,642, compared with a loss of £182,877 in 2012.

BALANCE SHEET

In the opinion of the Board the market value of the land and buildings is considerably greater than the book value. In view of the specialised nature of these assets, the Board considers that it is inappropriate to determine the market value. The total reserves of the Group and Charity are £3,493,443 and £3,521,756 respectively at the end of the financial year.

INVESTMENT POLICY AND PERFORMANCE

The present investment policy is to maximise the long term total return of the Charity's investment funds, subject to the risks normally associated with a balanced portfolio management. The charity does not restrict itself to any particular category of investment. The performance of the funds is measured against appropriate benchmark indices and during the year the result has exceeded all those benchmarks. The Investment Sub-Committee monitors investments with the assistance of the W H Ireland Ltd.

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STATEMENT AS TO DISCLOSURE OF INFORMATION TO AUDITORS

So far as the trustees are aware, there is no relevant audit information (as defined by Section 418 of the Companies Act 2006) of which the charity's auditors are unaware, and each director has taken all the steps that he ought to have taken as a director in order to make himself aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are aware of that information.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES



1 COMPANIES ACT 2006

The Charity is not a trading company and the Profit and Loss Account formats permitted under the provisions of the Companies Act 2006 are not considered appropriate to report the transactions of the Charity.

The Directors have presented the Income and Expenditure Account as part of the Statement of Financial Activities in a format which they consider fully explains the transactions of the Charity.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) Basis of accounting

Subject to note 2(c) and 2(i), these accounts are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) on Accounting and Reporting by Charities as Revised dated 2005.

The accounts consolidate the results of the Charity and its wholly owned subsidiary, The East Lancashire Masonic Hall Company Limited, on a line by line basis.

(b) Cash flow statement

The Group is exempt from the requirements to include a cash flow statement as part of its financial statements because it qualifies as small under the Companies Act 2006.

(c) Investment Income

Income from investments is recognised in the accounts at the date when it is received. This policy represents a departure from recommended accounting principles, which require income to be recognised in the accounts on an accruals basis. In the circumstances of this Charity, the directors consider it inappropriate to recognise this income until the date when it is due to be received. Other interest and rent receivable is accounted for on an accruals basis.

(d) Donations, legacies and grants

Donations, legacies and grants are recognised in the accounts at the date when these are received, as, in the opinion of the directors, it is not appropriate to recognise these at an earlier date. Grants and donations payable are recognised in the accounts at the date of authorisation.

(e) Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES continued

(f) Expenditure

Resources expended are recognised on an accruals basis and are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to specific headings, they have been allocated to activities on bases consistent with the use of the resources. Governance costs are those incurred in connection with the administration of the Charity.

(g) Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. No depreciation is provided on freehold land and buildings. The buildings are maintained to ensure that their value does not diminish over time and their realisable value, although not quantified, is in excess of their book value. In these circumstances, the directors consider that any charge for depreciation would not be material and thus it is inappropriate to charge depreciation on these assets.

Depreciation is provided on other tangible fixed assets in order to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life at the following rates and bases:

Lift 5% per annum straight line Improvements to leasehold property 5% per annum straight line Plant and machinery 33% per annum straight line

15% on reducing balance

Furniture, fixtures and equipment 10% per annum straight line

20% on reducing balance

Office machinery 25% & 33% per annum straight line

(h) Deferred tax

A deferred tax liability is recognised in respect of all material timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the balance sheet date.

A deferred tax asset is treated as recoverable and therefore recognised only when it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of underlying timing differences can be deducted.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES continued

(i) Investments

Listed investments are valued in the accounts at the mid-market price at the balance sheet date, including accrued interest where relevant. The surplus or deficiency arising from the valuation of investments is taken direct to the revaluation reserve. Unlisted investments are included at cost less provision for diminution in value. This policy represents a departure from recommended accounting principles, which require all investments to be included in the balance sheet at market value. The directors consider that it is not possible to establish with reasonable certainty the market value of the charity's investment in its subsidiary, without incurring disproportionate costs, which would not be beneficial to the charity.

Realised surpluses and deficits arising on disposals of investments determined by reference to the carrying value of the assets in the charity's balance sheet are included within Income and Expenditure for the year. Realised revaluation surpluses, representing the difference between historical cost and the carrying value of the assets, are reclassified by way of a transfer to general reserves in the year in which the disposal occurs.

(j) Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Assets obtained under hire purchase contracts or finance leases are capitalised in the balance sheet. Those held under hire purchase contracts are depreciated over their estimated useful lives. Those held under finance leases are depreciated over their useful lives or the lease term, whichever is the shorter.

The interest element of those obligations is charged to the statement of financial activities over the relevant period. The capital element of the future payments is treated as a liability.






